In mid-August Fire Chief Mark Bodane advised the Board of Directors that he would be retiring after 12 years of dedicated service to Brighton Fire and our communities. Chief Bodane had an amazing fire service career that spanned 44 years, 28 of those years as a fire chief. Both are amazing accomplishments. On November 14, 2019, Chief Bodane took his final walk at Station 52 in front of firefighters, board members present and past, community members and family. At the same walk off, I received the transfer of command from Chief Bodane and now serve as the fire chief for Brighton Fire Rescue District. I am honored and grateful to be appointed by the Board fo Directors as fire chief. We will work hard as a team to provide the high quality of service to all residents of the fire district.



The fire chief position is a humbling position, and while gratifying it can be challenging in the same breath. The fire district protects the City of Brighton, Town of Wattenberg, part of the City of Commerce City, and parts of the Towns of Henderson and Lochbuie. In addition, our area includes large unincorporated areas of Adams and Weld Counties. Our service area consists of 150 square miles protected from five fire stations.

2019 brought forth another busy year for the Brighton Fire Rescue District. Call volume totaled 6,350 incidents, a slight decrease from 2018. EMS/Rescue incidents continue to represent the majority of our calls with 3,719 incidents, a 1% decrease from 2018. Motor vehicle crashes (not represented in the EMS/Rescue call type) increased 1% from 667 in 2018 to 720 in 2019. Our wildfire season continues to be present a year-round challenge, but overall our total fire incidents decreased slightly with 152 fire incidents in 2019 compared to 166 in 2018.

Incident by Response District



With the continued increase in EMS/Rescue related calls, BFRD is constantly identifying value-added service delivery enhancements. In 2019, three firefighters graduated from Denver Health Paramedic School. BFRD responds to all EMS/Rescue incidents with a fire engine or ladder truck in addition to the services provided by our ambulance partner Platte Valley Ambulance Service through a contract with Platte Valley Medical Center.



BFRD continues to utilize closest unit dispatching in coordination with our dispatch center, Adams County Communication Center (ADCOM), through a Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) system. CAD allows the dispatchers to send the closest fire apparatus and ambulance to calls for service through Global Positioning System (GPS) and Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL). By utilizing AVL and GPS, residents get the closest fire apparatus and ambulance every time.



In 2019 the District's response time in the entire district was 9 minutes or less 87% of the time Here's how that breaks down by each station's coverage area: Station 51: 8 minutes or less 88% of the time Station 52: 8 minutes or less 84% of the time Station 53: 11 minutes or less 92% of the time Station 54: 12 minutes or less 85% of the time Station 55: 12 minutes or less 91% of the time

Fire District Response Time includes the time from when the unit is dispatched to the time when the unit arrives on scene. Fire stations in rural areas cover larger, less populated areas and have longer travel times.



BFRD remained committed to the North Area Fire Academy by providing equipment and adjunct instructors as needed. This regional approach to recruit firefighter training is in its eighth year and has proven to be a successful collaboration of organizations and resources. In 2019, BFRD is proud to have added our first three lateral hires which has proven to be a success.

In 2019, we completed the promotional process for the rank of Engineer. FF/Paramedic Logan Alberti, FF Brian Lopez and FF Leon Miller were all promoted to Engineer. Engineer Chris Elliott was promoted to Lieutenant while Lieutenant Kevin Carson was promoted to Training Captain. We had also hired Chief Kovacs as the new Battalion Chief of Training, Safety, and Special Operations who has since become our Deputy Chief.



Training of shift personnel continues to be an important component of firefighter readiness and competency. A number of training opportunities were provided such as active shooter/active threat with the North Area Fire Departments and Thornton PD. This opportunity included ten full days at Riverdale Ridge HS with student and staff role players. Another large, multi-day training was held at the old Great Indoors building. Crews performed multiple evolutions simulating a structure fire at a large commercial structure. Other training topics throughout the year included: apparatus operations, company officer development, and wildland firefighting. In 2019, Brighton Fire personnel completed a total of 12,929 hours of handson and classroom training.

Special Operations which includes Technical Rescue, Hazardous Materials Response, Water & Ice Rescue, and Wildland Firefighting continues to be a focus of BFRD. We continue to participate in the North Area Technical Rescue Team and the Adams Jefferson County Hazardous Materials Authority as part of regional response teams. We also coordinate training activities with our partners in southern Weld County as part of their hazardous materials response team. Special Operations team members are cross trained to handle their general firefighting/EMS duties along with their specific special operations requirements. As the District continues to grow our capabilities have also grown and we continue to evaluate our needs at a local and regional response level.







Ending 2019, BRFD placed an emphasis on firefighter wellness and career longevity of our members. We implemented fire ground gross decontamination to help with cancer prevention as well as firefighter rehab to ensure safety and best practices for our Firefighters. All three shifts received multi-company training covering both topics. We also filmed a training video on fire ground gross decontamination with the help of PIO Natalie Ridderbos, Captain John Blunt and FF Kenny Rosales. View the training video here:

Vehicle & Facility Maintenance

The Brighton Fire Rescue District Fleet and Facilities division maintains a modern, efficient, and reliable fleet of emergency vehicles, facilities, and equipment. Staff hold multiple Emergency Vehicle Technician (EVT) and Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) certifications, which allow them to perform multiple functions of a full-service maintenance facility. This division is responsible for all vehicles, trailers, equipment on vehicles and all five fire stations, training center, and the fleet/maintenance building. They perform a wide range of comprehensive maintenance, troubleshooting, and other related services on all vehicles and facilities.

Every year our fire inspectors visit each commercial property in our jurisdiction to complete a fire and life safety inspection. Also, all new businesses and construction projects are reviewed and inspected for code compliance as well. Reviews and inspections are important to ensure the safety of our firefighters and community.

Fire Prevention

Another huge part of our fire prevention efforts are accomplished through public education and interactions.
