

DISTRICT & FIRE STATIONS

The Fire District protects the City of Brighton, Town of Wattenberg, part of the City of Commerce City, and parts of the towns of Henderson and Lochbuie. In addition, our area includes large unincorporated areas of Adams and Weld counties. Our service area consists of 150 square miles protected from 5 fire stations.



The new Training Center being constructed at 5 S. Firehouse Rd, Brighton, CO 80601 will include training classrooms, inside and outside training areas and a Museum to showcase the history of The Brighton Fire Rescue District from 1888 – Present.



In 2023, some of the 20+ year old stations have been renovated and others upgraded. We broke ground on property for a new training center and identified a location for a 6th fire station.



OPERATIONS

The districts response plans were updated and now includes CAD to CAD response capabilities (Computer Aided Dispatch). This now means that the closest unit will be dispatched based on location of the units and not the fire station.


Two members were accepted on the Colorado Task Force 1 USAR Team as Heavy Rigging Specialists.



Of the academy graduates, 20 were Brighton hires.












EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

PLANNING & LOGISTICS

Due to exponential growth within our community, the need to create a new division for the fire district in 2022 was necessary. The Planning and Logistics Division was created to encompass several areas of the district. These areas include Station Maintenance & Projects, New Construction, IT, Radios & Communication, SCBAs, Grant Writing and Fundraising, Accreditation, Wildland, Hiring, and Annual Physicals.




